

# HARMONIUMS, OF D'ALMAINE & Co. 20, SOHO SQUARE, LONDON.


The Harmonium is one of the most charming Instruments of this age of invention; and though smaller than the common square Piano-Forte, it possesses all the continuity and depth of tone of the Organ, and is capable of pouring forth the most sweetly melodious & dulcet strains or of producing the powerful effects of a full orchestra, by means of stops which can be used at pleasure by the performer.

It is alike calculated for the Church, Chapel, Concert or Drawing room: for the glorious works of Handel, or the enlivening strains of the dance, and although nothing can ever supersede the Piano, yet the Royal Harmonium forms an excellent accompaniment to that Instrument, and also to the Harp, Voice, or Concertina, or all combined.


Any Piano Forte player can at once perform with facility on the Royal Harmonium: its touch is light and elastic, the action of the pedals by a gentle action of the feet, which creates the supply of wind is particularly easy. The immense volume of tone produced by this little Instrument, scarcely 3 feet high is capable of filling a building that would contain 1000 persons, thereby rendering it a valuable accessory to a Church or Chapel.
